The turnout at his farewell was testament to his popularity and impact in this role.



The last thing I wish to mention is that, following a review of the RFCAs by AVM Ross Paterson in 2014, the RFCAs have been re-organising themselves into a more common structure and re-balancing the workforce so as to better deliver the three outputs of estate management, cadets and youth and engagement. Not all of this could be achieved by normal retirement or adjusting roles and responsibilities of existing staff.

Members of the Northern Area Committee would wish to be aware that the biggest change will be felt by the Inverness Office, which will reduce in size and in future become an Estates Office just like Dumbaron and Aberdeen. All other roles will transfer to Dundee where the Engagement team will grow so as to accommodate this as well as to increase our marketing and communications capability and output. Change is never easy and our thoughts are with the Inverness staff. Hopefully this marks the end for some time to come.

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Association Annual Meeting a success

On Saturday 24 March, over 100 HRFCA members from across Scotland gathered at Queen's Barracks in Perth for the Annual Association Meeting (AAM).

They were greeted with spring sunshine, providing an opportunity for many to catch up with friends outside before making their way into the 7 SCOTS drill hall, transformed once again for the occasion into a mini-conference centre.

Following the Business Meeting part of the day, during which office bearers were elected or re-elected, HRFCA Chief Executive Brigadier Mark Dodson provided his annual review and State of the Nation report. In underlining the efforts made to manage the challenging financial environment which the Association, in common with its contemporaries across the UK, finds itself, he pointed to a range of activities and infrastructure projects, either under way – such as the replacement of Bruce House in Dunfermline – or already completed, including the Arbroath Joint Cadet Centre finished in March 2018, which demonstrate real progress.

The Chief Executive's report was followed by this year's keynote speaker, Mr Keith Brown MSP, at that time Cabinet Secretary for Economy, Jobs and Fair Work and Scottish Veterans' Minister. Mr Brown provided a summary of the Scottish Government's support to the armed forces community, including the cadets organisations, reservists and veterans. He described how initiatives such as the cadets' Linked Detachment programme, the reserve-friendly policies

of public sector employers, and the Veterans' Employability Strategy Group all contributed to the Government's commitment to the wider armed forces family.

Following a lively Q&A session, the meeting was then provided with a series of updates from senior Service leaders, focusing in turn on: the Council of Reserve Forces' and Cadets' Associations; the Royal Navy; the RAF, including the latest plans to mark the Service's Centenary; and on the Army, including future basing decisions. These, together with the announcement by HRFCA Chairman Captain Nick Dorman RNR of the launch of the Highland Cadet Forces Trust, and closing remarks by Association President, Rear Admiral Mike Gregory, made for what was generally

considered to be a stimulating and enjoyable series of briefings.

Members also enjoyed a musical interlude stylishly provided by the RAF Central Scotland Pipes and Drums, a buffet lunch served by Heaven Scent, and an opportunity to catch up with old friends and make new ones.

The Association would like to extend its thanks to all those who contributed to a most successful AAM, including in particular: Lieutenant Colonel Matt Sheldrick, CO 7 SCOTS, and his team, who once again hosted the event at Queen's Barracks; Air Vice Marshal Ross Paterson, Air Officer Scotland, for providing the Pipes and Drums; and the guest speakers, whose expert knowledge and openness was appreciated by all.

Leadership training with a difference!

Emloyees from all over Scotland were put through their paces at Exercise Executive Stretch during a weekend of leadership training at Redford Barracks in Edinburgh from 27-29 April.

Over 50 participants from a range of businesses took part to gain first-hand experience of the Reserve Forces and learn about the many valuable transferable skills which Reservists bring to their civilian employers.

Arriving on Friday afternoon, the participants were fed and watered by the SNIY, before learning some basic drill and cooking skills to prepare them for the challenges ahead.

A night in the barracks was followed by the shock of a 5am Reveille on Saturday and the participants, now split up into syndicates, headed out into the Pentland Hills where the hard work began! Activities included a gun run with 105 Regiment Royal Artillery, obstacle crossing with 71 Engineer Regiment, minefield vehicle extraction with 154 Regiment RLC and a message decryption lesson courtesy of 32 Royal Signal Regiment.

The syndicates also took part in a simulated emergency evacuation from a sinking ship, courtesy of the Royal Navy.

After a long day, the syndicates were then taken to their accommodation for the night – a woodland – where they were taught how to create a shelter, organise their kit and prepare their rations. Expert advice was provided by 6 Scots and a dry, if chilly night under canvas was had by all.

Day two was another early start and the syndicates returned to Redford Barracks for their toughest challenge yet; an energy sapping stretcher run and assault course.

The focus was very much on teamwork and, encouraged vociferously by their army instructors, the syndicates pushed, pulled and carried each other over the finish line to huge cheers from their



employers and friends. Once they had got their breath back, the participants had a welcome hot shower and change of clothes in time for the closing ceremony and prize giving.

Lt Col Toby Gaddum, Commanding Officer SNIY, praised the participants for their hard work and enthusiasm, and thanked the many service personnel who had put so much time and effort into making the event such a success.

Lunch was provided to round off the weekend, and the buzz and laughter as the teams mingled and congratulated each other showed how much everyone had enjoyed the experience, with lots of new friendships and business contacts having been made.

Georgia Dunk and Lara Mackay of Moray Chamber of Commerce were among those taking part.

Georgia said: "Without a doubt this is a training course not to be missed. Lara and I learned so much from this experience from basic soldiering skills to what it's like to be in the reserves, but most importantly our strengths and weaknesses within a team environment. I would really recommend that any organisation sends staff on this course next year.

"The skills Armed Forces Reservists learn from their training and ongoing experiences would benefit any workplace and the gain to both the individual and the employer are fantastic. The Reserve

Forces do fantastic work and Lara and I both left seeing the benefit of joining, even if it would mean having to survive off military standard ration packs again!"

Highland RFCA's Ron Macgregor said: "The aim of Executive Stretch is to demonstrate to employers the wide range of skills that Reservists can bring to the workplace, and for their employees to have the opportunity to develop their leadership and teamwork skills in a unique training environment.

"It is a great experience for all concerned and the teams taking part have really done themselves, and their employers, proud."



Farewell to REED Ron Macgregor

Ron climbed aboard (to a few cries of 'don't let him drive') and, in traditional military style, was taken off the premises to warm applause.

New £600k Joint Cadet Centre opens

A new £600,000 Joint Cadet Centre was officially opened in Arbroath.

The state-of-the-art building on Charles Avenue is being shared between 2422 (Arbroath) Squadron of the Air Training Corps and Army Cadets from Angus and Dundee Battalion ACF.

Guests – including Angus Provost Councillor Ronnie Proctor and representatives from local schools – were welcomed to the centre by Highland RFCA Chairman Nick Dorman.

Nick said: “The old Spooner Hut, which had stood on this site since the mid-70s and had definitely seen better days, was demolished last July. The new building was completed in March within budget and at an overall cost of a fraction over £600,000, shared between Highland RFCA and the RAF Air Cadets.

“All in all quite an achievement, and the end result is a facility that will be fully used and enjoyed by both Army Cadets and the Air Cadets.”


The opening ceremony was performed by Mrs Georgiana Osborne, Lord-Lieutenant of Angus.

She said: “It’s a super building, purpose-built specifically to provide modern facilities for cadets, and is a real demonstration of the fact that careful management of very limited budgets can produce first-class results.

“I am constantly struck by the value of the service cadet organisations, both to their members and to the wider communities from which they come. The chance to develop new life skills, to fulfil personal ambitions and to realise their full potential in an environment which is challenging, fun and above all safe, is one which many young people seize with both hands and go on to do great things.

“I would also like to pay tribute to the adults who lead and look after the cadets, both full-time and especially the volunteers, without whose dedication and commitment, not to mention good humour, the cadet organisations would simply not exist.”

Following the ceremony guests were given a tour of the centre and had a chance to meet the cadets who put on demonstrations including first aid and a display of Adventurous Training equipment. Guests were also taken to the site’s range where they watched cadets take part in rifle shooting.

Employers take to the water in P2000

HR FCA REED Michelle McKearnon and several employers joined HMS Charger for two days sailing down the Caledonian Canal and took part in training manoeuvres on Loch Ness.

The Royal Navy P2000 fast patrol boat is one of 14 used for training by University Royal Naval Units (URNUs).

Six of the ships visited Scotland in April, crewed by young officer cadets who were literally learning the ropes under the watchful eye of their commanding officers.

Michelle commented: "The young officer cadets were very impressive and had huge responsibility for all sorts of tasks, from providing lunch to managing the locks on the canal and practising rescuing our 'man' overboard. As confident and capable young people, they really showcased their skills."

Vincent Docherty, Head of Education for Aberdeen Council who also joined the ship as a guest of Highland RFCA, said: "This has been a first class experience from an education point of view. Watching the crew work together as a team and seeing all the transferable skills on offer, has been fascinating. I think this is a life-changing experience for these youngsters who are learning and developing in an exciting, but very supportive environment."

Colleen MacLean from DYW remarked that she was very excited to be taking new ideas back to schools after the trip, and that she had learned a great deal about the

many different career options in the Armed Forces.

"It was great to see curriculum subjects and themes such as science, technology, engineering, and mathematics in action," she said, adding: "These cadets would be an asset to any employer."

To round off the trip, Lochaber Chamber

of Commerce signed the Armed Forces Covenant, pledging their support for veterans, reservists and cadets as future employees. The document was signed by Chamber director Johnny Bell and was co-signed on behalf of the Ministry of Defence (MoD) by HMS Charger's Commanding Officer, Lt Paul Harsent RN. **See page 12 for more AFC news.**

Police Scotland pledges its support

The signing of Armed Forces Covenants in the HRFCA area continues apace with 80+ (and counting) signed to date!

While each of these signings (large or small) represents a boost to members of the Armed Forces, there was one in particular which stood out: mainly because it took several years of planning by HRFCA REED Ron Macgregor and his police opposite number Stefan Grzybowski to bring it to fruition.

Police Scotland signed the Covenant on 17 April at the Scottish Police College at Tulliallan.

Deputy Chief Constable Iain Livingstone signed on behalf of Police Scotland with the document co-signed on behalf of the Ministry of Defence (MoD) by Colonel Charlie Wallace, Deputy Commander of 51 Brigade.

The move enables Police Scotland staff and officers to become members of the Reserves, as far as the operational demands of the service allows.

It also underlines the force's commitment to supporting its

current officers who are also Reservists and entitles staff to up to 10 days' paid leave to attend reservist training.

A new Standard Operating Procedure has also been issued to standardise conditions of service for those within Police Scotland who continue to serve in the military. The force is the second largest in the UK.

Police Scotland joins more than 2000 UK organisations to have now signed the Armed Forces Covenant.

HRFCA Head of Engagement Dai John attended the signing. He said: "We are absolutely delighted that by signing the Armed Forces Covenant Police Scotland has demonstrated its commitment to the volunteer reservists drawn from among its staff and officers. The Covenant is there to support both the individual reservist and the employer by helping to balance the challenges of reserve service with a full-time career, ensuring that the needs of both are met as fully as possible. On behalf of the volunteer reservists serving in all our Armed Forces we offer our sincerest thanks."

The Highland Cadet Forces Trust

I was delighted – and somewhat surprised – to be asked to be the Founding Chairman/Trustee of the new venture known as “The Highland Cadet Forces Trust”.

I was also excited about the potential which this new charity has for the promotion of the Service Cadet movement in our area and, more importantly, about the opportunities it will create to allow the young people and adult volunteers of the cadet movement to develop leadership and life/social skills.

As I go around Scotland in my capacity as Lord Lyon, and in other capacities, I frequently witness the work of the cadets alongside the dedicated service of the adult volunteers.

Together with the founding Trustees, we set about obtaining the necessary charitable status to be able to commence fundraising in order to secure and enhance the valuable role of the cadet movement. Those formalities are now completed, and the time has come to reach out to those who are supportive of the cadet movement and ask for contributions to set in motion the Trust’s ability to develop and sponsor activities.

The vision is that, alongside the existing work of the cadets, we shall secure a future for the cadet movement that is clearly placed in “advanced mode”. The purpose within our constitution sounds very grand, namely “to benefit the public of Scotland”.

I myself, and many others, can attest to the many stories of the cadets who do this regularly and the impact which their activities have on our communities. These activities and their impact often fail to be recognised, but they undoubtedly benefit the public of Scotland.

The purposes of the Trust include the promotion of education, citizenship, community development, public participation, and equality and diversity. We all recognise the importance of the cadet movement in developing citizenship and leadership in young people through their activities – for example through participation in aspects of community life such as music and sporting activities – thus effectively promoting self confidence and developing social skills.

We need to move this valued activity into an environment which allows for more adventurous approaches in order to challenge young people to develop, not



only in the field of physical activities, but also in the area of volunteering.

There is, for me, some “icing on the cake” in that the Trust offers further opportunities for inclusion, should we be able to raise the necessary funds to promote this work. In essence the Trust hopes, through the cadet movement, to mitigate disadvantage in the broadest sense amongst young people. This work in my view creates a culture of respect which is greatly needed and valued as a building block in leadership and community life.

The Trust now begins its ‘long march’
