# Tough times ahead in 2024

## t has been a very busy autumn for HRFCA and the Reserve and cadet units we support.

Having eventually received a budget to deliver employer engagement the Regional Employer Engagement Directors have barely been in the office as they try to catch up with a backlog

of employer meetings and deliver various employer events. At the same time the rest of the Engagement and Communications team has assisted the Area Chairs to deliver their autumn membership meetings with very successful events in Nairn and Glenrothes and a much smaller event for the Southern Area Committee.

The delivery of the Future Defence Infrastructure System (FDIS) on the volunteer estate draws ever closer and, at the time of writing, only requires HM Treasury approval before it is enacted next year.

This will generate a significant additional workload for the Estates department through the winter as they prepare for their new

roles and hand over site data, contractors and contract data to Mitie, the regional prime contractor who will take on the Hard Facilities Management role from us.

The switch over is likely to occur in June or July next year and be completed by the end of the year. It will amount to a significant change for all of our units and a communications plan will follow once the final sign-off has been given.

Having been in being for 10 years now, and with an ever

growing number of Armed Forces Covenants and Employer Recognition Scheme Awards, there is a review of the Defence Relationship Management (DRM) role and outputs under way in the Ministry of Defence. Whilst everyone understands that employer engagement is an essential activity for Reserves, it will be conducted against the backdrop of significant in-year

savings within the defence community and in the knowledge that operating budgets for DRM and the RFCAs will not grow next year, despite the inflationary pressures we are all experiencing. Tough times are ahead.

But, as can be seen from the range and breadth of the activities we have conducted or supported, we will continue to add value wherever we can, continue to champion the Reserves and cadets with the single Services, government and the local communities. It is very good news that Captain Nick Dorman RNR has been selected to be the Council of RFCAs Board Chair in London where he will play a key role in shaping the RFCA future and interacting with Ministry of Defence officials and Ministers.

# The £6.6 million project to replace the Army Reserve Centre (ARC) at Dunfermline is under way.

The site offices have been set up and ground works started. Initial works (pictured top of page) saw a small brick building demolished, a portable building relocated and a trench for the high voltage cable excavated.

Work on the project had to be suspended temporarily on 16 November after hazardous material was uncovered during the initial works. The material was of a historic nature (self-igniting phosphorus incendiary devices) and had been buried following the Second World War. The devices were intended for use by the Home Guard. Experts from the British Army's 11 Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Search Regiment, 521 Squadron Edinburgh Troop, attended along with the other emergency services. They removed the devices and safely disposed of them on site by carrying out a controlled explosion on 17 November.

The incident was then stood down.

After the discovery a temporary exclusion zone was put in place as a precaution, leading to a road closure and evacuations of properties and a nearby business.

The Bothwell House project had originally been due to get under way in March 2020. However COVID-19 hit and the national lockdown that followed halted all projects that weren't already in progress.

In 2022 Henry Brothers won the contract to design and build the new ARC and demolish the original Bruce House.

Mott MacDonald is acting as technical service providers, supporting the Highland RFCA Estates team with project management. The Army-funded project is due to be completed in 2025.

The Dunfermline ARC serves as the Regimental Headquarters for 154 (Scottish) Regiment Royal Logistics Corps (RLC); and is home to 239 (Fife) Transport Squadron and the Dunfermline Detachment of The Black Watch Battalion Army Cadet Force (ACF).

The new building will provide first-class facilities, allowing all the units housed there a chance to grow, and will impact positively on training, recruitment and retention.

A ground-breaking ceremony was held at the site on 13 August to formally mark the start of the project. The ceremony was carried out by Councillor Jim Leishman MBE, Provost of Fife.

# Golden night for employers

# Leven employer organisations had their outstanding commitment to the Armed Forces recognised at the 2023 Defence Employer Recognition Scheme (ERS) Gold Awards.

The Highland RFCA-organised event was held at Scone Palace on November 9 with the recipients representing a wide range of organisations and companies from both the public and private sectors.

Nationally, 193 organisations have been recognised by the UK Government for their outstanding support towards the Armed Forces community. This is a record high for Golds since the Employer Recognition Scheme launched in 2013. The ERS Gold Award is the highest badge of honour and recognises the positive role employers play in supporting the Armed Forces community.

The Employer Recognition Scheme, delivered by Defence Relationship Management, has a current total of 641 Gold holders. Organisations must reapply every five years to retain their Gold Award status.

To win a Gold Award from the Ministry of Defence, organisations must provide 10 extra paid days leave for Reservists and have supportive HR policies in place for Reservists, Veterans, Cadet Force Adult Volunteers (CFAVs) and the spouses and partners of those serving in the Armed Forces.

They must also advocate the benefits of supporting those within the Armed Forces community, by encouraging other organisations to sign the Armed Forces Covenant and engage in the Employer Recognition Scheme.

Principal guest at Scone Palace was Vice Admiral Phil Hally, Chief of Defence People (CDP). Vice Admiral Hally presented the Awards and delivered a speech on the Employer Recognition Scheme and the value of Reservists to civil society.

He said: "We are here tonight to celebrate your success as employers who have been awarded the accolade of Gold status in support of our nation's Defence.

"As I look around the room, I see a rich diversity of organisations, private and public sector, large and small. The support you provide is so much more than just about employees who have signed up to become Reservists. Your organisations support the whole Armed

Forces community from the support you give to families of Service personnel to the opportunities you provide Forces spouses and partners.

"I want to say a heartfelt thank you and congratulations to you all on behalf of UK Defence and Government."

During the evening guests also heard from serving Royal Air Force (RAF) Reservist AS1 Virginia Ankers of Lossiemouth-based 2622 Squadron; Cadet Force Adult Volunteer Lieutenant Colonel Sarah High, Deputy Commandant of Angus and Dundee Battalion Army Cadet Force (ACF); and Stephen Massetti, Chair of HRFCA's Highland Gold Network. # ighland RFCA's Southern, Northern and Eastern Area Committee members gathered for the annual Area Meetings.

The Committees typically meet annually in the autumn for updates on challenges, developments, achievements and future plans.

The Southern Area Meeting (SAM) was the first of the three, which took place virtually via Zoom. It was conducted from the HRFCA headquarters in Dundee on 4 October. The Area Chair Captain (Retired) Chris Smith led the meeting. HRFCA's Chief Executive Brigadier (Retired) Mark Dodson, Deputy Chief Executive Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) Andrew Macnaughton, and Head of Engagement Mrs Michelle McKearnon were in attendance face-to-face with Captain Smith.

The SAM began with the Area Chair's introduction, welcome, and report. The Chief Executive provided an update on key changes since the Annual Association Meeting (AAM) in April.

The Northern Area Meeting (NAM) took place at the Royal British Legion Scotland Nairn Branch on 18 October. This was the new Area Chair Major (Retired) Alec Rose's first official Area Meeting since being appointed in the role. However, he chaired last year's NAM as the Vice Chair at the time on behalf of

Commodore (Retired) Angus Ross. Ms Glenda Gray, who is also an Employer Representative as the HR Manager at Aberdeenshire Council, is the current Vice Chair. The Eastern Area Committee gathered for its updates at the Army Reserve Centre in Glenrothes on 1 November. Eastern Area Chair Colonel (Retired) Jim Kinloch led the Eastern Area Meeting

(EAM), welcoming and updating the members before handing over to Brigadier (Retd) Mark Dodson for his report.

# The newly-refurbished Cadet Training Centre at Boddam was officially opened on 27 August.

The occasion was marked by a day of celebrations at the site near Peterhead in Aberdeenshire.

The £1.6 million two-phase redevelopment was completed earlier this year with the building handed back by principal contractor Morrison Construction on 21 April to 2nd Battalion The Highlanders Army Cadet Force.

The first phase of the Highland RFCA Estates team's development saw the creation of a Four-Tube Firing Range, Parade Square, and the old Shetland Accommodation Block being refurbished into an IT Suite and classroom space (named the Ken Masson Learning Suite). Phase 2 added a new drill hall and stores provision.

Ken Masson was, for nearly 20 years, a Cadet Executive Officer with the Battalion.
